



We said "We have eyes. We have two eyes."






We said "We have a left eye and a right eye."

We said "We use eyes to see."










We said "We have one nose with two nostrils."






We said "We use a nose."
We said "We use a nose to smell."





We Said Senses



High Frequency Words: we said have one two a right left to see look with and use eat

<u>Phonics Exploration:</u> (initial/ending & vowel sounds, blends, decoding)

t - two, to, eat, left, right, touch
n - nose, nostrils, listen
h - have, hear, hand(s)
r - right, hear, ear(s)
l - left, look, listen, lips, feel
ee/ea - see, feel, eat
ou - mouth
sm - smell
sn - sniff
s - any word beginning/ending with 's'
decoding: sniff, lips, listen, nostril(s)

Foundations: body parts, senses, prediction, direction (left/right & arrows), colors, numbers, counting, letter sounds (see phonics above), HFWs, punctuation (""), patterns - make sure to look closely, there are many!

<u>Inquiry</u>: What can you say about your senses? How do you make your senses work? Why do we talk about our senses?
